
NEW PENALTY NOTICES FOR UNAUTHORISED LATES AND ABSENCES FROM SEPTEMBER 2024

From September 2024, penalty notices will be £80 per parent per child (if paid within 21 days, rising to £160 if paid between 21 and 28 days). A second penalty notice within a rolling three-year period will be £160 per parent per child. Unpaid penalty notices will be considered for prosecution. A third penalty notice within three years cannot be issued, so prosecution or parenting orders will be considered as alternatives. Prosecution can lead to fines of £2500 or 3-months imprisonment. 8 or more unauthorised marks within a tenweek period may result in a penalty notice being issued.





Our Head students, Phoebe, Hodan, Alex, James and Nushanti, did an incredible job of selecting which policies they wanted to campaign on and then creating a video whereby they canvassed the remaining BFS students for their votes.







The Year 12 politics class, Alp, Will, Lilly, Elshba, Jemie, Tommy and Isaac were superb at running the polling station and really grew into their roles as the day went on. Despite the windy conditions, an incredible 851 students voted today giving us a turnout of 88%. As with the real election, we did have some spoilt ballot papers.

How To Fail by Elizabeth Day Review by Anonymous

This is an inspiring and popular book that gives everyone an insight into failing and how to overcome it. It is a nonfiction, feminist biography which shows stories of Day's life and growing up. It is well-suited for teenagers and adults. She spreads personal stories for people to relate to. It is a funny and honest celebration of things going wrong and embraces that failure is a part of life.


The book is inspired by her popular podcast where she interviews famous people and discusses their failures. It is interesting to look at role models and people who have done brilliant things and to see how their failures helped to shape them. This book is funny and an honest celebration of things going wrong.

A quote which summarises the book is:

'If I have learned one thing from this shockingly beautiful venture called life, it is this: failure has taught me lessons I would never otherwise have understood. I have evolved more as a result of things going wrong than when everything seemed to be going right' (Elizabeth Day).

I would highly recommend this book especially for students who are feeling stressed or under pressure at school and want to see that failure is a part of eventual success.

School Attendance: The law is changing

From 19th August 2024

Penalty Notice Fines for School Attendance are changing

The government is introducing a new National Framework for Penalty Notices

5 days of unauthorised absence

Penalty Notice fines may be issued for any term-time absences that are unauthorised (for example, a 5-day term-time holiday) - whether these absences are taken consecutively or cumulatively over a rolling period of 10 school weeks

10 sessions of unauthorised absence in any 10-week period

Penalty Notice fines will also be considered when there have been 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in any rolling period of 10 school weeks

> A school day has 2 sessions: 1 morning and 1 afternoon session per day

A school week means any week in which there is at least one school session. The threshold can be met with any combination of unauthorised absence (e.g. 6 sessions of holiday plus 4 sessions of arriving late after the register closes all within 10 school weeks). These sessions can be consecutive (e.g. 10 sessions of holiday in one week) or not (e.g. 6 sessions of unauthorised absence taken in 1 week and 1 per week for the next 4 weeks). The period of 10 school weeks can also span different terms or school years (e.g. 2 sessions of unauthorised absence in the Summer Term and a further 8 within the Autumn Term).

What is a Penalty Notice?

A Penalty Notice is an out of court settlement which is intended to change behaviour without the need for criminal prosecution. If repeated penalty notices are being issued and they are not working to change behaviour they are unlikely to be most appropriate tool. Therefore, from August 2024, only 2 Penalty Notices can be issued to the same parent in respect of the same child within a 3-year rolling period and any second Penalty Notice within that period is charged at a higher rate. Any further offences may result in criminal prosecution.

The law will be clear that where a Penalty Notice threshold is met – in each individual case, the school **must** consider if a Penalty Notice is appropriate

First Offence

The first time a Penalty Notice is issued for a Term-Time Leave of Absence or irregular attendance, the amount will be:

£160 per parent, per child (if paid within 28 days)

Reduced to: £80 per parent, per child if paid within 21 days

Second Offence (in a 3-year rolling period)

The second time a Penalty Notice is issued for a Term-Time Leave of Absence or irregular attendance to the **same parent** for the **same child** the amount will be:

£160 per parent, per child (if paid within 28 days)

There is no reduction in the amount.

<u>Third Offence or Any Further Offences</u> (in a 3-year rolling period)

The third time an offence is committed for a Term-Time
Leave of Absence or irregular attendance by the same parent
for the same child (including those by other Local
Authorities) a Penalty Notice will NOT be issued but will be
referred to Bristol City Council's Education Welfare service
for Prosecution which may result in fines of upto £2,500 per
parent, per child.

Cases found guilty in a Magistrate's Court can show on a parent's future DBS certificate.

Bristol City Council have the discretion to issue Penalty
Notice fines before the above threshold is met in cases
where parents are deliberately avoiding the national
threshold by taking several term time holidays below the
threshold, or for repeated absences for birthdays or other
family events.

Unchanged

Penalty Notice fines are issued **Per Parent, Per child**. This means that fines are issued to each parent, for each child who is absent. For example: If 2 siblings are absent for a term-time holiday this will result in each parent receiving 2 separate fines.

Funding in schools has been under increasing pressure for several years now and we work tirelessly, with less resources, to provide the best possible experiences for your children. It is increasingly challenging to continue to deliver and improve on the additional experiences and opportunities we offer.





With this in mind, we are re-launching the BFS Fund to help us provide some of those extras that make all the difference to school life, that we otherwise may not afford. BFS fund will go towards improving our school environment and sustaining our wide range of extracurricular and enrichment activities.

Initiatives include:
