Attendance and Attainment are Linked

New research by the Department for Education has shown that attendance strongly affects students' attainment.

The DfE have said: "Year 11 pupils with nearperfect attendance are almost twice as likely to achieve grade 5 in English and Maths GCSE, compared to similar pupils attending 90-95% of the time. In other words, missing just 10 extra days a year reduces the likelihood of achieving these grades by around 50%."

Please check your child's attendance on the My Child At School app – remember that to be good, an attendance record needs to be 96% or above. If you are worried about your child's attendance, please contact the Attendance Office.

Arriving in Alagna, a charming and rustic Walser village nestled close to the Swiss Border, we immediately made ourselves known to locals by trying to manoeuvre our massive coach in the wrong direction through a one-way narrow street of this UNESCO World Heritage site, very nearly taking out a couple of World Heritage buildings as we went. Thankfully, no harm was done as some friendly locals came to our rescue and, eventually, we made it through the beautiful streets of the village unscathed and to our charming and traditional Alpine hotel.



Despite our arrival late in the ski season, the Alagna resort provided access to perfect skiing conditions up to 3000m above sea level on Monte Rosa Massif – the second highest mountain in Italy. The Alagna resort is renowned as a haven for expert skiers with some challenging black runs and our more experienced BFS skiers took to these like absolute pros under the supervision of their skilled and charismatic instructor Pico, who quickly became an icon within the group. Like a duck to water, Ms Conole accompanied the top group on some difficult runs with Mr Lam in his characteristic elegant skiing style - which can only be described as 'vogueing'.

Meanwhile, Mr Howard swiftly made his way up to accompanying our intermediate groups and became a skiing maestro despite a few initial tumbles. Ms Davis, Mr Laxon, Ms Bezuidenhout and Ms Jones stuck with the beginners on the nursery slope. In the true BFS spirit of 'ambition', the students did not remain



beginners for long and quickly progressed to skiing backwards and tackling jumps before moving further up the mountain onto the steeper blue runs.

Students demonstrated incredible resilience, with our group quickly dispersing into large beginners' intermediate and upper intermediate groups within the first couple of days of skiing. Notably, Alagna's blue and red runs are known to be more challenging than other resorts and our students took this level of challenge completely in their stride, bouncing back from any falls and carefully mastering how to control their speed and quickly progressing 'snowplowing' to parallel skiing to tackle the steepest of slopes



We are immensely proud of our students who persevered despite finding skiing challenging in the first instance. A massive shout out to Cody and Hannah, who found skiing a bit tricky in the first few days but refused to give up. Both made it up to some challenging blue runs and it was amazing to see their tenacity and resilience in learning to ski and making the most of this opportunity.



Another highlight was seeing our students that had started off as beginners having the confidence and courage to attempt some tricky ski jumps later in the week under the careful guidance of their expert instructors – the video of Ben says it all!



Despite the intrepidness of our students in making the most of this opportunity, injuries were far and few between aside from a couple of altitude-induced nosebleeds. However, we must give a special shout out to brave Mr Laxon who had to be emergency-evacuated from the slopes to Borgosesia for a knee injury from an awkward fall. He showed courage in enduring the 25-hour coach journey back to BFS, not only with a torn ACL but also alongside Isaac's singing. We wish him a speedy recovery and hope to see him back on the slopes soon!



Another highlight of the trip was students engaging in the karaoke night with such gusto and delivering some old school bangers. Weirdly, the hotel restaurant saw local customers vacate very promptly after our opening number, but we will just assume this is purely coincidence!



A personal highlight was the number of individuals we crossed paths with (restaurant owners, resort rep, neighbours and Carrefour workers subjected to the students' nightly snack-stampede) commenting on how respectful and polite our students had been in comparison to other school groups they had encountered. The students really were a credit to our school community.



A huge thank you is needed for the staff who helped to run this trip - the ski trip would be impossible to run without staff willing to give up their holidays to supervise students in Italy.

A massive thank you to Ms Bezuidenhout and Ms Davis as our designated first aiders and for taking care of all our students' medical needs with such diligence during their stay.



A big thanks is also owed to Mr Howard and Mr Laxon for giving up their time and going above and beyond to make this a trip to remember for students. Thank you Mr Howard for your enthusiasm in running extra ski sessions after tuition. Thank you Mr Laxon for instilling some of your worldly wisdom in students during the 'sketch and ski' session - in the words of Mr Howard: "you're a walking Chat GPT".

Finally, a massive thank you to Ms Meech, Ms Eynon, Ms Chown and Ms Gallacher for the incredible job that they do behind the scenes in ensuring this trip ran smoothly. You were a huge part of the success of this trip.



This trip has been a real joy to run - we are so proud of our students and have really enjoyed getting to know them in a context outside of the school environment. They have demonstrated impeccable behaviour, ambition and real sense of community. It was so lovely to see their eagerness to ski together at the end of the day, despite variances in ability, and the support and encouragement they offered one another throughout the trip.

Work Experience Employer Talks Careers Day



In this week's employer talk, students heard from three employees of Great Western Railway (GWR) about working in rail transport. Emily Tovey is GWR's Bristol Guards Manager, Dwain White is the Deputy Area Revenue Protection Manager and Laura Maddison is a coach and mentor for apprentices. Students learnt about the exciting apprenticeship opportunities at GWR in customer service and engineering, which provide apprentices with a range of experiences across the



across which provide apprentices with a range of experiences across the business and on-the-job training. The apprenticeships also offer access to the Duke of Edinburgh Business Gold Award, which helps them further develop their skillset through volunteering, a residential programme and expedition. It's also useful for answering interview questions in the GWR selection process.

Each of the speakers shared their varied career journeys before joining GWR. Emily was a youth worker and estate agent and was working in a pastoral role at a secondary school before joining GWR as a conductor. She now helps to manage the safety and wellbeing of GWR's train guards. Dwain worked with young people in prison, where he learnt that the "biggest weapon is your mouth". He told students how customer service is at the heart of all jobs at GWR. "We look for people who like to talk to other people," he said. His role now is managing a team whose job is to catch people who haven't paid their train fare, something that costs GWR huge amounts of money each year. Part of the role is keeping on top of technology so they can stop tech-based fraud like the creation of fake passes, which they can now do by scanning all cards. There are lots of job opportunities for young people with IT skills to help GWR stay ahead of the fraudsters. Laura told students about her journey from trainee hairdresser to a job in payroll in the GWR finance department, through HR and 'learning and development' to her current role working with apprentices.

With 375 different types of jobs, from ticket sales and on-board services to control room management and inspecting the wheels of trains, GWR offers many varied career possibilities for people with a wide range of skills, interest and backgrounds. Many thanks to Emily, Dwain and Laura for shining a light on working life on the railways.


