

Battlefields Trip

Staff and students met at 5am on Monday to embark on BFS' annual trip to the WWI battlefields. Although many students were unaware the world existed at this hour, their bright eyes and bushy tailed nature carried them through the 8 hour journey to Ypres.

Upon arrival at Ypres students visited the 'In Flanders Field Museum', discussing the topography of the battlefield, before heading on for a traditional Flemish supper of half a chicken and chips. Following this, Laurence Chandler and Esme Hearn laid a wreath during a remembrance ceremony at the Menin Gate on behalf of BFS. They were joined by esteemed company with 70s rockers Slade also paying their respects. The evening ended with a fine rendition of the greatest hits of the 80s and 90s, much to the delight of Mrs Paredes Bartlett.

Tuesday morning was met by bleary eyed students filling up on pain au chocolat before departing to the Somme, the sight of the most attritional battles of WWI. Visits were made to Vimy Ridge, Thiepval and Newfoundland Park with students immersing themselves in the changing tactics of 1916. The evening ended with escargots and Miss Holyoake dressing as a WW1 nurse in a display of uniform of the frontline.

The final day of the visit saw students refocus on the Ypres Salient and visit Tynecot and Langemarck cemeteries to compare the ways in which both sides' war dead were remembered.

The visit was a great success due to the excellent behaviour of the students and support of Mrs Smith, Mr Green, Miss Holyoake, Mr MacBlain, Mrs Paredes Bartlett and Miss Monsell. Next year's trip is in the calendar.
