

Words from the Headteacher

Dear Parents, Carers and Students

Now we have entered the advent period it is beginning to feel a lot more festive. Here at BFS we have started earlier than usual with our Christmas decorations. We have several Christmas Trees around the school site including a 10 foot tree in the dining hall. Thank you to some of our very helpful Year 12s who have done a great job decorating it. We plan to start playing Christmas music at lunchtimes very soon! On a more serious note, we are also asking students to look outwards and use this festive season to think of those who are less fortunate. Over the last few years BFS has always supported local charities with food donations and fundraising. This year we would like to do even more to help as this pandemic has disproportionately impacted on poorer families and vulnerable people.

This year we will be supporting the following local charities:

- North Bristol Food Bank we need food donations
- FareShare the charity supported by Marcus Rashford being led by our Sixth Form Community and Charity Committee. Christmas gift donations urgently needed
- Caring for Christmas fundraising via ParentPay (non-uniform day 18 Dec)





Each charity has a slightly different focus and therefore we can collect a range of food, non-food and monetary donations. There has been much research and evidence that helping others has mental health benefits for the giver. Please read the article in the newsletter and let's make 2020 our best fundraiser Christmas yet.

Back to the classroom, Year 11 and Year 13 will be receiving their mock 1 results over the next few lessons. Time will be spent identifying knowledge gaps and revision themes as part of the feedback process. The exact form GCSE and A Level exams will take in the summer is still unclear. The announcement from the DFE this week reassuring us that exams will be marked more generously and topic lists will be shared to support students' revision is definitely a step in the right direction. I am relieved since young people are understandably anxious about sitting full papers when they have missed time in school. The most important thing for Year 11 and Year 13 now is to focus on their own progress and not worry about things out of their control. They need to listen to feedback carefully, practise exam questions regularly and work hard. I am confident if we stay focused these two cohorts will do really well in the summer...whatever happens with the exam format.

We say goodbye to Ms Kolkowska next week who has taught art whilst Mrs Stokes was on maternity leave. We wish her the very best in her new teaching position and thank her for the contribution she has made to BFS in her time here. We welcome Mrs Parry back from Maternity leave, It's great to see you and we hope you are settling in well.

Finally I would like to say how well the students are doing at the moment. It has been a long term with lots of uncertainty; however their approach and positive attitude is fantastic.

COVID-secure arrangements such as substantial screens, visiting pods, and window visits. Outdoor/airtight visits only (rollout of rapid testing will enable indoor visits including contact). LARGE EVENTS



Avoid travelling outside your area, other than where necessary such as for work or education. Further exemptions apply. Reduce the number of journeys where possible. Plan ahead and avoid busy times and routes on public transport. Avoid car sharing with those outside of your household or support bubble.

Classes and organised adult sport can take place outdoors, but people should avoid higher-risk contact activity. Group exercise activities and sports indoors should not take place, unless with your household or bubble. Organised activities for elite athletes, under-18s and disabled

people can continue.

Events should not take place. Drive-in events permitted.

Department challenged students to produce a piece of research into an area of BME



BFS SCIENCE



Home Science Experiment—Red Cabbage Indicator



Tis the season when red cabbage is back on the menu. If you have a few spare cabbage leaves you can very quickly make an effective pH indicator.

Due to the current restrictions on practicals in school we have suggested a few experiments for students to do at home and this has been the most successful yet. Chop, crush and boil in a small amount of warm water to get a purple liquid that will change colour when mixed with acidic or alkali

chemicals. The more purple your cabbage water the better it works.


Many house hold items can be tested; baking soda, soap, vinegar, tooth paste, milk and lemon juice all work well, but anything is worth a try.

What happens if you test vinegar and then add some bicarbonate of soda to the mix? Test the colours for yourself.




Bring in the **Christmas** spirit and mark your calendars, **DECEMBER**17! It's not too late to sign up!

We hope you enjoy reading them as much as we have.



They are also hand building large scale pots – watch this space for those...they are looking fabulous!






